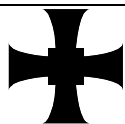

This system is being introduced to make it easier for students to access catering, printing and library services and to help movement around the school. Much time is lost if students forget or lose their card. Please return outstanding forms before the Easter break as students cannot use this system unless we receive a signed consent form.

We are very proud of the success of so many of our students in a whole range of events and you will read about some of these in the body of this newsletter. Particular congratulations to our gymnasts who competed in the British Schools Gymnastics Milano Team National Finals last weekend. They performed exceptionally well to qualify to represent the North region and gaining 6th place in the Under 16 Boys section and 13th place in the Under 16 Girls is an amazing achievement. We are very proud, also, of our Boccia teams who got through to the regional finals in Liverpool to represent the county and gained second place, only just beaten in a thrilling final.

Well done also to our musicians and singers who did so brilliantly in the Carlisle and District Music Festival last week. There were many individual successes and our Senior Chamber Choir came first in the sacred song category, winning a major trophy for the most inspiring choral performance of the festival. Our school orchestra came first in both the school orchestra and open orchestra class with the adjudicator saying that their performance was one of the best she had ever heard. Congratulations to all the students involved, and thank you to the Music Department staff who have worked with them.

CHAPLAINCY

As we come up to Easter it looks as though the spring might finally be approaching! School has been busy and students face a number of challenges as some move closer to exams and some try to deal with complex lives.

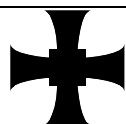
This half term we have been roughly following the theme of Lent in form times, with its own challenges of self-discipline and thinking about changing habits. Our own themes have been: Respect, Self-Discipline and Forgiveness. As part of Respect we looked at the language we use towards each other, acknowledging the power of words. We also considered gender issues and remembered the struggles of the suffragettes. International Women's Day was marked in school with a trail and quiz put together by Mrs Barker and supported by the library staff. This told the story of several remarkable women, and students were able to read about them via posters spread throughout the school. Archdeacon Lee Townend visited Sixth Form in February and we did a joint assembly with Year 13 on the idea of Church Schools encouraging a search for truth and self-respect. Two principal student questions were discussed: one about the role of the church in shaping and contributing to, our political system, and the second on religion and science, especially whether the stories in the Bible should be viewed as 'truth.' This is something we would like to hold again, with students being enabled to participate more fully in a discussion. Three of our Year 12 students will be taking part in the Maundy Thursday service at the Cathedral, asking questions to clergy who will be re-committing to their vocations.

Through the theme of Self-Discipline we considered the amount of time students spend on iPhones and social media - and the challenge of building in some quiet/technology free time into daily routines. We also looked at the value of getting outside and connecting with the natural world. Miss Bates' Year 7 form in Everest House demonstrated self-discipline by doing a sponsored silence and raising money for charity!

Forgiveness has been a challenging theme. Students have been encouraged to see it as a strength, to set it alongside justice, and to understand it as a Christian value. Youth Network leaders came into Lower School assemblies to link this to the Easter story and to give examples of leaders who have lived out forgiveness. In the last week of this term Forgiveness will be coupled with the theme of new life, as we look at the Easter story and what that could mean in our contemporary context. We will be thinking about our own hopes for the future and the world.

Despite the challenges of the current education system, I am constantly encouraged by the hope, resilience and creativity of many of our students; by their capacity to find wonder in the everyday, and to stay humorous. There is of course, sorrow and struggle in growing up, and the pressures of life today are definitely felt by most. Human encounters and listening to one another are hugely important as we try to travel along and make sense of our complex world- and the post of Chaplain is a great privilege. The sorrows, struggles, hopes and aspirations of students are living things and part of the landscape of school. We are always thinking of ways to incorporate these more authentically into 'collective worship' (Thought for the Day in form time, and our assemblies), and to harness and build them into different forms of 'service' in the world. INFORMATION AND REMINDERS

High Standards

We have many systems that we use to keep students safe and happy in school and to maintain high standards of behaviour so that high quality learning can take place. We think that, from time to time, it is worth sharing with you some of the systems we use to maintain discipline, so that you can support us at home when issues arise. We believe firmly that if we work together this supports not only your child, but the majority of students in our care. We are an inclusive school, but work hard not to allow the behaviour of a small number of students to spoil learning for the majority. We do, of course, operate a reward system alongside the behaviour system and so far this year students have collectively earned 207150 reward points since September.

Below is a summary of some the sanctions that we operate:

- An immediate 10 minute detention for students who are late to lessons, forget equipment or wear incorrect uniform. This is held with a member of the senior team at break and after school.
- A longer whole school detention for students who do not attend the shorter detention and for those who repeatedly forget homework.
- Internal exclusion and seclusion, more serious sanctions for persistent problems.
- Quiet Room referrals, where students are sent when they are preventing others from learning, or the teacher from teaching, in lessons.
- The 'Good Neighbour' scheme, where students are removed from lessons to work in another class where they have prevented others from learning, or the teacher from teaching, in a previous lesson.

We expect all students to follow the instruction of their teacher immediately and without question. This includes referral to some of the systems above. Students who do not follow reasonable instructions from staff may be subject to further sanctions, typically a half day internal or external exclusion where we could ask parents/carers to collect their child from school.

Instrumental Fees 2017/18

A reminder to parents/carers who are not paying by monthly standing order payments: the second instalment is due to reach us by 31.3.18. If payments are not up to date unfortunately students may not be allowed to continue with lessons. Payment can be made by standing order, credit/debit card either with ParentPay or by phoning the Finance Office. Payments by cash and cheque are still acceptable, cheques should be made payable to "Trinity School".

Should a student wish to stop taking lessons we will require 4 weeks paid notice in writing.

Cumbria Music Service operates an Instrument lease scheme which is available to any young person in Cumbria. There is also an Assisted Instrument Purchase Scheme run by Cumbria Music Service enabling students receiving tuition with Cumbria Music Service Teachers to purchase their own instrument without paying VAT. Please contact Mrs Richardson, Head of Music, for more information about this scheme.

Payment for School Meals:

Please ensure you give your children the correct change for topping up their school meal a/c's at the re-valuers as change is not given and may not be available in school.

The new re-valuer machines unfortunately do not take Scottish notes so please make sure your child has acceptable money to use in them. Payment by cheque is acceptable but cheques must be made payable to 'Mellors Catering Services Ltd'. Parents/carers are reminded that topping up can also be done via ParentPay with a credit or debit card.

Cheque Payments: Just a reminder that if you are sending a cheque payment into school you should write clearly on the back the students name, form and reason for payment.

Parent Pay

The procedure for students that have no funds on their school meals account has been updated and is effective from 16.04.18.

A student with no funds to purchase a school meal will be allowed to overspend up to the value of a free school meal allowance to spend on the day, which is currently £2.15. The parent/carer will be notified that there are no funds available on the day so that the account can be credited.

The overspend will be deducted from the student's balance once the account has been credited.

There are a number of different ways that credit can be added to the student card and these are briefly described below:

1. **Revaluers - for use by students.** There are a number of these units placed around the school. To credit their school meal account students insert their card into the device and then insert coins or notes. The system credits this to their card and shows the total on screen. This can be done at any time during the day. You should ensure that students bring the correct amount of money to top-up their school meals account as change is not readily available in school.

2. **ParentPay.** This is our preferred method of payment. Parents set up a secure on-line account and credit money to the card as they choose. There are many extra benefits to using this system as it removes the need for students to carry cash and ensures the students eat meals in school. Parents have full control over their child's account and can view information about their eating habits. If you already have a child in school, siblings can be added to your existing ParentPay account.
3. **Cheque Payments.** We are able to accept cheque payments at reception during normal reception hours 8am to 4.30pm on Mon-Thurs and 8am to 3.30pm on Friday. Cheques for school meals, received before 11 am, will be credited to the students account by lunchtime that day. Cheques should be made payable to Mellors Catering Ltd.
4. **Card Payments.** We accept credit and debit card top ups to student cards and payments for trips etc – parents/carers can pay online via ParentPay, phone the Finance Office on 403560 or pay at reception (payments by phone or at reception will be accepted during the hours stated below for cash payments).

Should you not be in a position to 'top up' the account please contact the pastoral team via the Head of House.

The 'Parent Pay' aspect of the above message seems particularly relevant presently as we seem to be encountering more and more students reporting to school with sweets, chocolate, crisps and fizzy drinks, often in excessive and certainly unhealthy amounts. Please be mindful of the damaging effects of a poor diet, which as well as the obvious nutritional issues can also adversely affect classroom concentration and student attainment.

We are concerned that in some instances this is reflective of a poor choice of spending with monies given to children for school lunches. Setting up a secure online 'Parent-Pay' account and topping up cards from home is highly recommended as a means to ensure that all students are encouraged to eat from a healthy school menu on a regular basis.

E-safety

As our students become teenagers, it's most likely that the internet and a variety of social media will be part of their daily life. They'll adapt quickly to new technology and use it to communicate, socialise and create. Most teenagers have access to the internet using a smartphone or tablet, and use a wide range of social networking sites as a vital part of their relationships with others. They are now commonly known as 'millennials'!

Whilst such dynamic communication tools can be an extremely positive part of modern day lifestyles, they can also be the source of much misery for students, parents and carers who fail to stay abreast with the developing 'pitfalls' of social media. In support, please be aware that we do maintain a 'staying safe online' section on our school website, which is updated frequently. Examples of recent news articles include "Teen Sexting may be more common than you think" and "Social media sites harming pupils' mental health, heads warn". There are also useful documents offering guidance, such as, "A practical guide for parent and carers whose children are using social media".

Please do take some time to explore the wide variety of articles, documents and videos on the website to support our collective ability to safeguard children from the preventable issues linked to social media misuse. Should you have any questions/concerns relating to this topic, please remember that Pastoral staff in School will be readily available.

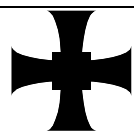
West Bromwich Albion won the FA Cup (they were good then Mr Brookes!)

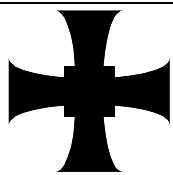
Dutch Visitors

On Tuesday 13th March we welcomed 41 students and 3 members of staff (Kees van Kessel, Guido van Genk and Emma Douglas) from the Beatrix College, Tilburg in The Netherlands on a visit to Trinity School. The aim of the day was to give the Dutch students a feel of English school life and to see what similarities and differences exist between our two school systems.

Each Dutch student was paired up with a Trinity student from either Years 8, 9 or 10 and shadowed them through their day, attending lessons. At lunchtime they had a typical school lunch which they enjoyed as they don't serve hot meals in Holland! This was followed by an engaging Student Voice discussion about our different curriculums, rules and requirements. Notably, school uniform was a talking point, as Dutch students do not wear one. One student remarked that our school uniform reminded them of Harry Potter! Our students were impressed by how many foreign languages their Dutch counterparts have to learn e.g. French, German and English and also by how many subjects they study at 'A' level equivalent – here we study 3 or 4, in The Netherlands it is 6 to 8.

The Dutch teachers shadowed our staff in Art, Humanities and Drama and were really impressed not only with our facilities and teaching styles, but with students' work and the whole 'feel' of the school.

This was a hugely successful visit, as it not only served to broaden our students' horizons and open a wider world to them, but also the Dutch students gained a lot of information to help them with their European Project qualification.

Kilimanjaro House

It is hard to believe it is Easter already as it has been such a busy term that it has gone by so quickly.

Firstly, we would like to congratulate James Bell from 7ARI for his brilliant performance recently at the Scottish Indoor Athletics championships in Glasgow. James became interested in running just over a year ago when he joined the Carlisle and Aspatria Athletics Club and he has gone from strength to strength. He competed at the Emirates Arena in Glasgow on the 10th of March. He ran the 60 metre sprint and won a silver medal with a PB of 8.14 seconds. James narrowly missed gold by 1/100th of a second. He was beaten by the Irish national champion. He then went on to run the 200m sprint where he won gold with a PB of 26.47 seconds. This means that James is now the Scottish National under 13 Indoor Champion for the 200 m. He now sits in 8th place for the 60m and in second place in the 200m. Well done James from Kili House, we are ever so proud of you and all the best for your next race.

Several students in Kilimanjaro House took part in the Carlisle Music festival where they were very successful and won in quite a few categories. It is always a pleasure to hear about students going the extra mile to achieve and succeed in something they really enjoy. Huge congratulations to Neo Borgia and Martin Atkinson who came second in the brass group and won three trophies.

Students have been involved in many discussions in from time following assemblies on diversity and equality. These themes have sparked a great deal of debate. Here is a quote from Mrs Reay form tutor of 9MRY, "This term has been a celebration and a moment of awe as we saw the snow fall and enjoyed precious moments with family and friends but also a time of reflection. We have considered the importance of school values and looked for inspiration in others. We have celebrated diversity and discussed the need for equality. Students have shown great respect to each other by allowing freedom of speech. We have been learning that with self discipline all things are possible. Students have also been making important decisions about their GCSE options and are embarking on their exciting individual personal journeys."

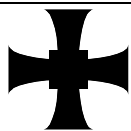

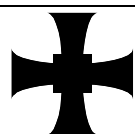

Boys Football

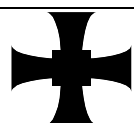

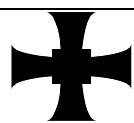
British Schools Gymnastics Milano Team National Finals

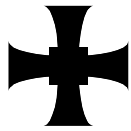
