DROP EVERYTHING AND READ



WHAT IS DEAR?

- DEAR is a regular time set aside in the classroom schedule for both students and teachers to simply 'drop everything and read'.
- Repetition of DEAR across a school week will not only promote the importance of reading but also highlight that it is an essential life skill, not just a requirement of English lessons.
- DEAR tends to be scheduled at the same time each day or week, so that students recognise that reading is a priority and can also look forward to reading for pleasure.
- DEAR allows students to take ownership of developing this essential skill through reading something of their own choosing. Ultimately,
 DEAR has the capacity to accommodate a variety of interests and abilities as students must select books for himself/herself.

WHY DO WE NEED TO READ?


- First and foremost, we want to inspire students to read and help them to simply enjoy a book.
- However, we must also seek to equip all students with core literacy skills. There has been a noticeable increase in reading required to
 access GCSE exam questions across all subjects; many questions now require students to read, understand and infer information
 from extended pieces of text before attempting the subject specific task.
- Research has proven that one of the best ways to develop literacy skills is through extended periods of reading. DEAR time is just one
 of the reading initiatives in place to support the improvement of student literacy.

DEAR AT TRINITY

- Reading should be communal, shared. Initially, the form tutor will read to the students from the year group book e.g. The Giver by Lois Lowry. All students will read along as the teacher reads.
- Students should be used to reading aloud in English lessons so that as confidence and familiarity builds students could be asked to read short sections. reading of students is often not as engaging as that of the adult.
- Either prior to, during or after reading, students will be asked questions of their reading - simple recall, to recap questions and predictions, to inference and deduction.

YR7 GOLDFISH BOY BY LISA THOMPSON




YR7 SWAN SONG BY GILL LEWIS





Life is not safe for Alem. His father is Ethopian, his mother Eritrean. Their countries are at war, and Alem is welcome in neither place.









YR8 ROOFTOPPERS BY KATHERINE RUNDELL


YR8 RAT BY PATRICE LAWRENCE


YR8 OUTWALKERS BY FIONA SHAW




YR9 THE CURIOUS INCIDENT OF THE DOG IN THE NIGHT-TIME
